General Submission Guidelines

ARTICLE CATEGORIES

- Research Articles: 6,000–8,000 words (flexible in exceptional cases)
- Legislative Notes and Case Comments: 2,000–4,000 words
- Book Reviews: 1,000–2,000 words

Note: All word limits are exclusive of references.

Please note that Legislative Notes/Case Comments and Book Reviews are generally solicited by the journal's editorial board. Please see the documents hyperlinked on the Submission Guidelines main page for the detailed guidelines on these two sections. We encourage those interested in these sections to first express interest through the modes mentioned in the respective guidelines and proceed to the submission process only after hearing from the editorial board.

GENERAL GUIDELINES

- Submissions must be made via the journal's online portal by clicking on the 'Submit Article' tab on the home page. You may check the status of your submission at any time by logging into 'My Account' on the journal website.
- There are no fees for submission or publication.
- Manuscripts must not have been published already or be under consideration by another publication.
- Any instance of plagiarism will result in the rejection of the manuscript and will affect possibilities of future publication in this journal.
- The submission process consists of the following steps:

1. Read and accept the Article Submission Agreement
 2. Provide information about yourself
 3. Provide information about any authors
 4. Upload your article and related items
- Before you begin, please be sure you have the following items:
 1. Article title
 2. Abstract (100–150 words)
 3. Keywords (4–6)
 4. Article in one of the following formats: Microsoft Word or RTF

Since the peer review process is anonymous, articles must be submitted without a title page, author name, abstract, or page number. These will be provided by the system.

Note: JLPP follows the online-first publication model. This allows completed articles to be published online prior to their inclusion in a final print and online journal issue. This significantly reduces the lead time between submission and publication.
